A Message from Pastor Chris

As we embark on our journey through the season of Lent in 2025, we move from the solemnity of ashes to the celebration of palms, walking on a steadfast journey towards the cross, and new life founded in the resurrection of Jesus.



This year we mark our transition from the time after the Epiphany into the season of Lent with the observance of Shrove Tuesday (Mardi Gras), followed by our celebration of Ash Wednesday. The Men's Breakfast group is hosting a **Pancake Supper at 6:00 pm on Tuesday, March 4th** Any donations received will be used in support of St. Boniface Street Links.

We will gather at **7:00 pm on March 5th for our Ash Wednesday worship** service. Here we will be invited into the observance of the season of Lent, during which we prepare our hearts and minds for the coming festivals of Holy Week. During this worship service we will receive the sign of ashes, accompanied by the words "Remember, you are dust . . ." which serve as a potent reminder of both our mortal nature as well as our status as God's own creation, formed from the dust of the earth in and through the power of Word of God.



Thus in the season of Lent, as we move from the imposition of ashes, through these 40 days to the Easter joy which lies beyond the cross, we symbolically move from the old Adam, formed from the dust of the earth, to the new Adam (Christ) formed of God's own Spirit, underscoring God's redemptive acts to restore the wholeness and sanctity of creation through the gift of God's own self.



The season of Lent is fundamentally about spiritual preparation and growth, making ourselves ready for the celebration of the events of Holy Week and the joy of the risen Christ. We invite you to pick up practices that will help you to grow as a person of faith. We will gather each Wednesday during Lent (March 12-April 9th) at **5:30 for a meal of Soup and Bread**, followed by as service of **Holden Evening prayer at 6:30 pm**.

There are many resources available to foster a life of prayer or daily devotional practices. Our Holy Week services begin on April 13th with the celebration of Palm/Passion Sunday. Here we begin with the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and end with the reading of an account of the arrest and trial of Jesus. The second half of the service allows those unable to participate in the services during Holy Week to hear the stories of the Last Supper, and the arrest, trial and crucifixion of Jesus.





Our observance of the Three Days begins on April 17th as we gather at 7:00 pm for our Maundy Thursday service. In this service we find Jesus in the upper room with the disciples where he washes their feet and gives them the commandment to "... love one another." We will participate in foot washing as a reminder that we too are made clean by Christ in order that we might demonstrate our love of God and our neighbour to the world around us. At the conclusion of this service, the altar area is

stripped of decoration as we prepare for Good Friday. (continued on page 3)

Community Missions: How your donations and support are making a difference in our community

Over the past two years, Faith's Community Missions Committee has refined and strengthened the ways in which we support those in need in our community. We are so thankful for your continued generosity—from financial support, to help preparing food; shopping for, packing or delivering hampers; knitting blankets, donating clothing and toiletries, or helping fill bins in the narthex with a wide range of 'most needed' items.

Here's an update on what's been happening over the last couple of months.

Baby Layettes for Healthy Start

Healthy Start is a parent support program that facilitates 9 drop-in groups throughout Winnipeg neighborhoods. These groups provide information, resources and support to prenatal moms and families with children under 1year of age. Our congregation has been making baby layettes for the past 11 years. This year we made 60 layettes that are given to Newcomer families as a welcome, as well as to families in need. The Wednesday morning fellowship group and friends knitted and crocheted 68 baby blankets to be included in each layette. The layettes are very appreciated by the families that receive them.





Christmas hampers

• Thanks to those who shopped for, assembled and delivered 27 Christmas hampers, which included larger families than in prior years.

Rene Deleurme Centre

We shop for grocery and household items on a quarterly basis for the pantry at the Rene Deleurme
Centre, which supports familiars in need in the surrounding neighbourhood on St. Anne's Road. Our
most recent delivery, shortly before Christmas, included dairy products, frozen foods, diapers and
other items on their most needed list.

The Urban

Your generosity made it possible to help fill gift bags for people of all ages at *The Urban* at Christmas. As well, your continued donations of specific clothing needs have been very appreciated.

Refugee sponsorship

One refugee sponsorship application was approved recently. There are no more in our queue, while the federal government agencies involved clear their backlog.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace

Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) is a volunteer organization that with the help of monetary donations and the giving of time from people, make beds for children that don't have a bed of their own to sleep in. With group builds of 25-35 volunteers they can make up to 30 beds in approx. 4 hours. Then a team from SHP will install these beds to the people in need. All tools and materials will be provided. Experienced or no experience in building. All are welcome to help people in need.



- We have booked a build date for SHP on Saturday April 12th 10:00 a.m. 2:00 p.m. Will be in an indoor facility at the Bowman industrial park.
- SHP ask that we arrive at 9:30 a.m. to share in coffee and pastries supplied by them.
- Donations of **new** twin bedding including sheets, pillows and comforters are greatly appreciated. You may also make a financial donation towards these items and well as the supplies needed for building the beds.
- Watch for a sign up sheet in the narthex for this SHP build!

Street Links

- As colder weather arrived, our support for Street Links and the homeless community they serve shifted to smaller, more frequent deliveries of chili, shepherd's pie and sandwiches, along with your donations of winter clothing.
- Three members of Faith attended an Open House at Street Links in December. We had an opportunity to tour the facility at 604 St. Mary's Road. Women are housed in rooms that previously served as offices in the old St. Vital City Hall, while men are housed dorm-style in an open area surrounded by office dividers providing privacy. Everyone has a military style cot and a large plastic tote for personal possessions. Once or twice a week those staying at the site are driven over to the YMCA on Fermor Avenue for a shower, as there are no shower facilities in the building. Street Links once again expressed their sincere gratitude on behalf of the homeless community, for our continued support.

Lutheran Urban Ministry (the Urban) - April Appeal

A few weeks ago, Pastor Chris preached a sermon on being kind, loving your enemies, doing good. He left us with homework to ponder in the coming week- where are the places where love is found, where goodness is evident, where service is paramount (not his words exactly lol).



One of the places where love is found and goodness is evident is right in our building every day of the week, all year long. Bins are found under a table and in small places and cupboards where the goodness is evident in socks, baby layettes, food and blankets, and everything a person in need would require for shelter, food and security. Those places of goodness reveal a community in service meeting a community in need.

One of those places of love and goodness held all kinds of things that were needed to fulfill the ministry of the Urban; where the vulnerable needed supports, encouragement and needs for everyday life. This winter love was found in coats, boots, Christmas gifts, toys, books and food. Many times the gifts of goodness and love were brought to Faith Lutheran Church and lovingly packed up in vehicles that took the journey to the Urban, found at Lutheran Church of the Cross on Arlington. Many times over, the people of Faith, a community in service, answered the call to serve the Urban, a community in need.

This journey of goodness and love is a call from God to be the people of God in and among the vulnerable. Thank you to those who have heard this call and to those who love and share their abundance to those who live in scarcity. Please continue to watch for the call to serve in giving what is requested from the Urban. If you want to go beyond the giving of goods aspect of service, they would certainly welcome you at their many sharing circles as well. Please pray for those who manage this ministry of hope, and for those who enter the doors of the Urban each day. And pray that God will continue to be in our hearts and minds as we serve the Urban again and again.

Vulnerable: (adjective) easy to hurt or attack physically or emotionally

Everyone reading this has experienced and knows the sensation of feeling vulnerable. This feeling has no boundaries of status, race, or wealth. Within our lives we can experience vulnerability within relationships, during times of national economic instability, or in workplace, school, social, or health situations. For many of us it's an anecdotal memory, "I remember when ….happened" or "I remember feeling…." – and maybe not experienced often.

But we might remember that our own feeling at the time might have created a paralysis of action, or a feeling of foreboding, or fear, or of defeat, or the awful feeling of the need to have our guard up. Loneliness can also increase the sense of vulnerability. Sometimes a topic in our sharing circles will touch on a subject that includes the factors that can cause the feelings of vulnerability in various situations in life.

For people who live with housing and/or food insecurity, or job insecurity, or experience racial bias, or who live with mental and/or physical health challenges - that feeling of vulnerability, of not knowing what is ahead in life (or the next day) - that vulnerable feeling can feel like it's constant. It can be compounded by past or current trauma, grief or loss.

In the Christian faith we are reminded that Jesus spoke of - and focused on - the vulnerable and those living in the margins of society. He often picked them out of the crowd and got up close and personal. The scribes and priests stayed in the synagogues and focused on the law. On January 21 at the National Cathedral, Bishop Mariann Edgar Budde spoke truth to power to the newly inaugurated president. Her words of appeal for mercy, care, and compassion to the vulnerable created the anger, unease, vitriol and retaliation that has occurred throughout history when truth is spoken to the powerful with agendas not aligned with fair and equitable treatment toward others.

Along with other small groups and the congregation, we collected baby layette items for Healthy Start during the months of January and February.



Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results. But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.

Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, Lessons in Chemistry is as original and vibrant as its protagonist.


March 25, 2025 - *The Phoenix Crown* by Kate Quinn and Janie Chan

San Francisco, 1906. In a city bustling with newly minted millionaires and scheming upstarts, two very different women hope to change their fortunes: Gemma, a golden-haired, silver-voiced soprano whose career desperately needs rekindling, and Suling, a petite and resolute Chinatown embroideress who is determined to escape an arranged marriage. Their paths cross when they are drawn into the orbit of Henry Thornton, a charming railroad magnate whose extraordinary collection of Chinese antiques includes the fabled Phoenix Crown, a legendary relic of Beijing's fallen Summer Palace.

His patronage offers Gemma and Suling the chance of a lifetime, but their lives are thrown into turmoil when a devastating earthquake rips San Francisco apart and Thornton disappears, leaving behind a mystery reaching further than anyone could have imagined . . . until the Phoenix Crown reappears five years later at a sumptuous Paris costume ball, drawing Gemma and Suling together in one last desperate quest for justice.

The selection for March 27th, is *The*Chancellor; The Remarkable Odessey of Angela Merkel by Katie Marton

Angela Merkel has always been an outsider. A pastor's daughter raised in Soviet-controlled East Germany, she spent her twenties working as a research chemist, entering politics only after the fall of the Berlin Wall. And yet within fifteen years, she had become chancellor of Germany and, before long, the unofficial leader of the West.

Kati Marton sets out to pierce the mystery of Merkel's unlikely ascent. With unparalleled access to the chancellor's inner circle and a trove of records only recently come to light, she teases out the unique political genius that had been the secret to Merkel's success. No modern leader so ably confronted Russian aggression, enacted daring social policies, and calmly unified an entire continent in an era when countries are becoming more divided. Again and again, she cleverly outmaneuvered strongmen like Putin and Trump, and weathered surprisingly complicated relationships with allies like Obama and Macron.

Famously private, the woman who emerges from this account is a role model for anyone interested in gaining and keeping power while staying true to one's moral convictions. A riveting political biography, an intimate human portrait, and a revelatory look at successful leadership in action, The Chancellor brings forth one of the most extraordinary women of our time.

The selection for April 24th, is *State of Terror* by Hillary Rodham Clinton and Louise Penny

State of Terror follows a novice Secretary of State who has joined the administration of her rival,

a president inaugurated after four years of American leadership that shrank from the world stage.
